Dear Mr. Fielding:

Every year, AUMA members have the opportunity to submit resolutions on issues of importance to them. These resolution are then presented, debated, and voted on by our members at the fall Convention. If passed, the resolutions remain active for three years, after which time they expire. On behalf of AUMA's Board, I am pleased to provide information on the outcome of the City of Calgary's expired 2014 resolution.

The resolution entitled "Increasing Fines for Speeding on Residential Roads" called for AUMA to urge the Government of Alberta to amend the *Traffic Safety Act* to increase fines for speeding offences on residential streets. The province's response confirmed that increased fines would be considered as part of the renewal of the Traffic Safety Plan, which strives to reduce serious injuries and fatalities. AUMA was pleased to see that our advocacy contributed to the province's decision to enact a general traffic fine increase of 35 per cent and a distracted driving fine increase of 65 per cent, which came into effect on May 1, 2015.
